INTERVIEW GUIDE #2

The interview questions I will ask are mainly for you (look/point towards the family "back home" who are participating via skype/phone/WhatsApp), however everyone is welcome and encouraged to participate in the discussion. Please feel free to stop the interview at any time to ask questions or if you want to stop participating in the study. Also, please remember that you are not required to answer any questions you do not wish to answer.

Do you have any questions before we begin?

I will turn on the recorder now ...

For each question ask all family members who are participating on the call to share their perspective. Throughout the interview also ask the family members in Canada if they would like to add or comment on anything.

- 1. Can you begin by telling me who you are and what your relationship is to your family here in Canada?
- 2. I would be interested to hear what your thoughts and feelings are regarding your family's move to Canada... Can you tell me about how this experience has been for you? Is there any intention for you or other family members to come to Canada? If yes, can you tell me about this plan?
- 3. Can you tell me about how and how often, you maintain contact with your family here in Canada? Have you visited your family here in Canada? If yes, can you tell me about this experience (when, circumstances, feelings about it)?
- 4. I would now like to ask you about the support you provide to your family here in Canadaany kind of support, including emotional, financial, spiritual, practical...Can you describe to me what kinds of things you do to be helpful to them, and how? Can you give me some examples?

Probes:

- a. Is there anything specific that you help with back home (e.g., taking care of family members, accessing resources)?
- b. Is there anything specific that you have helped with in Canada when visiting or through contacts you have here?
- c. Are there specific things that you do for different family members (e.g., parents, children, grandparents)?
- d. Are there specific things that you do to help our family with raising and caring for their children? Can you share some examples?
